You'll notice the two spects that are visually oriented, there in the sitting room, you'll have the active LED zones and clear action, which are high on a P series. As much as you all watch movies or sports, you'd probably see the difference, but the one thing that's sell me was the AIDO 1.11 AC WiFi, that's the next generation internet spects. And if you want to stream shows and content like YouTube, there's a great advantage. You wanna upgrade your router, about a 150 dollars but you'll be glad you did. I'm not sure what kind of broadband packaging you have but you wanna fast connection. I'd get 50meg option from media comp. Be best to get it right from the hub when you do the switch, run a CAT5 cable directly to TV. If you can't get the CAT5 cable, you might wanna think about the M series. Let me know if you have any questions.

Are you kidding me? Here's what I sent back to Steve. Just so that you know. I said, hey thanks, I think. You definitely figured out what I need, now if I could figure out what you told me to do, I'd be set. I think I'll have to get you and S.B. together because I don't know what the crap any of that is. **David:** Ok, so this addresses Jonathan's question perfectly. So that style of communication, that Steve just sent to you in an email, is that something, how did Jonathan say it, he said, is that something that, is that how they were raised or is that just how their brain was designed to work? And if it's how their brain was designed to work, can it be changed or should be changed?
